

PROJECT REVIEW SUPPORT NOTES

1 Evaluate the storybook

Look back at the requirements in the SPB and ask yourself:

- overall, how successful do you feel your storybook is? What do you really like about the finished product? How could it be further improved if you had time?
- what did your reviewers think of the final product?
- how successful is the cover page in attracting attention to the storybook?
- how well does the contents page allow the reader to access different parts of the story?
- does the story run smoothly into the 2 different endings?
- are the animations suitable endings to the story?
- is the final product suitable for your chosen audience? Think about the language you have used, the writing style, the overall design of the pages and the assets you have used.
- do your assets create the right effect?
- do the multimedia assets enhance the story?
- are all the assets copyright-free?
- what problems did you have creating or sourcing suitable assets? How did you overcome these?
- did you make good use of feedback?

What would you do differently if you produced a similar product and why?

2 Evaluate the project as a whole

Think about:

- what you set out to achieve
- to what extent you have met the objectives
- how well your plan worked
- how well you managed your time
- whether you chose the right people as your test users and reviewers
- what, if anything, went wrong
- what others had to say
- what improvements you would make if you had time
- what you would do differently if you did the project again.

Use feedback from others to support what you have to say.

3 Evaluate your own performance

Questions you should ask include:

- how well did you work during the project?
- did you keep to deadlines and targets?
- how do you think your work on this project affected your performance in other work?
- how have you benefited from working on the project?
- what would you do differently if you did the project again?
